
Parish Council News



Gwennap Parish Council have been busy at work in **Frogpool Cemetery** over the last two months.

Volunteers spent a day cutting back and clearing the top section of the cemetery to reveal a large raised walled flower bed, a smaller 'island' planter and a bench—all of which had been completely overgrown for many years! The area will look beautiful once planted out and it will be a wonderful place for visitors to sit and remember their loved ones. The shed has been cleared out and is going to have a new window fitted, followed by a good coat of paint to smarten it up and new guttering and a drain pipe.

In addition to the volunteer work, the Parish Council have also had some tree surgery carried out to enable the native trees to thrive and flourish, and to prevent some roots damaging nearby graves. Finally a local contractor has levelled the path and resurfaced it. They have also laid a tarmac path around the very top section of the cemetery which will start being used for burials over the course of the next year. The newly laid path will mean that the entire cemetery is accessible to all.











In October Gwennap Parish Council held the first **Neighbourhood Development Plan** meeting and were delighted to see so many people from the community keen to be involved in this exciting and important process. WATCH YOUR SPEED



The highways department recently deployed a speed

survey for 8 days on the road between Pulla Cross and Frogpool. The survey highlighted regular incidents of speeding on this road and the transport and police departments have been sent a copy of the survey results. The parish council will be liaising with these departments to discuss the installation of some form of speed calming measures. In the meantime, the Parish Council would like to remind everyone that the speed limit along this road is **30mph** and that the road is regularly used by dog walkers, cyclists and horse riders.

Cusgarne & Frogpool Football Club

At the time of writing both teams at Frogpool & Cusgarne have just over half of their games left to play. Both teams are currently in healthy league positions. The First team currently sit mid-table in Trelawny Division 2, with the Reserves flying high at the top of Division 3.

The First Team have had some impressive results this season under the guidance of the experienced Nick Mallaber and his trusty assistants. They overcame Troon AFC of the Premier Division 2-1 after an exhausting 120 minutes of football in the Percy Stephens Cup. They also recently beat Mawnan Reserves 6-2 in a home league game. This particular result was even more impressive and satisfying due to the fact that Mawnan hadn't lost a single competitive fixture to date. The squad has a very good team spirit within the camp which is clear for everyone to see. Add this to all the new signings that have been made they should have a strong second half to the season. We'll also have to see whether top scorers Mike Rollason or Kevin Smith add to their already impressive totals. Manager Nick Mallaber had this to say on the season so far and what his hopes are for the remainder of the campaign "We've had a very good start to the season. We need to kick on and hopefully get promotion in what is a very tough league this season".

The Reserves have also had another superb start to the season. This is down to a team spirit like no other. A new addition to the squad at the start of the season, David Leach, has scored the bulk of the goals with 14 to his name so far. However he has recently left for New Zealand so others will have to step up to the mark. But with Sam Bromley on 8 and Tom Campbell along with Craig Rothwell on 6, they have many players who are capable of helping them stay at the top of the table. They are currently on a 6 match unbeaten run. One recent result in that run was a 4-4 draw against fellow promotion chasers St Day 3rds. This was described as one of the most entertaining games seen at this level for a while. The Reserves came back from 3 -0 down and then 4-3 down to secure the point. A Ryan Martt double, Sam Bromley and Dave Leach with the goals. They also remain in both the Russell Hall and Arthur Pearce Cups. Dan Templeton, who's in charge, had these words to say on the season "This is the best team we've had within the Reserves in my six years at the club as a player and manager. We've played some exceptional football so far and could definitely win the league if we keep it up". He also added his thoughts for the rest of the season "We need to keep enjoying our football and play with the same passion and desire as we have done so far". There's one thing for sure, this team is

worth keeping an eye out for this season and in the future.

As a club we are also proud of the merchandise and club kit we produce for our players and supporters alike. The Reserve Team have recently had a new kit, courtesy of Hummel. Big thanks to Nick Palmer for the kit printing, but also importantly Blue Flame for being main sponsors. Without them there wouldn't be a new kit. The club also try and put on regular social events. This is to keep the bond between the two teams. The most recent event was a Horse Racing night organised by Scott Jones. A good amount of money was raised from the evening which also included a raffle auction, where some good prizes were on offer. Big thanks to all companies who donated prizes, in particular the Cornish Arms and JV Richards Butchers, for looking after their own.

Finally, training is every Wednesday starting prompt at 6:30 until around 8pm. We play our games on Saturday's with 2:30pm kick offs. An exception to this is cup games which are 2pm. The work at Cusgarne Manor is progressing nicely. Under the scaffolding lid, the house is being completely re-roofed in wet-laid scantle. The main roof trusses have survived in great condition but a lot of the purlins had rotted out, so the carpenter has been strengthening the existing structure and replacing timber where really necessary. In the white part of the house, we found an older set of timbers beneath, and a few straws in the dust which showed that part at least was once thatched. Some emergency masonry repair has also been carried out to the gable end which was bulging badly and to the dangerous chimney stacks. One of the beautiful windows has been taken out and is undergoing painstaking renovation. Some bits of rot were found but it was in remarkable condition considering it is thought to date back to 1710-1720. One down, nine to go! We're very pleased with the improvements we've made to the old farm lane and the

entrance onto the United Downs road. It's a bit wider and safer now, with reclaimed gateposts and some lovely Cornish hedging work. A bit late in the year, but we've been planting crocuses and daffodils along the lane this week. Hopefully they will have time to poke their heads out for us in the spring.

It was a beautiful sunny day, and with a vintage feel to the proceedings with bone china and bunting, everyone enjoyed tea and cakes and a chat. Including donations and a raffle, a total of £500 was raised and donated to the Invictus Trust, a charity that helps support young people with mental health problems In Cornwall. Thank you to everyone who helped in the organisation, baking or by supporting the event.

A presentation of the cheque took place at the October meeting of the Cusgarne and Frogpool WI. Sharon and Steve Cowburn, Trustees from the Invictus Trust received the cheque on behalf of the charity and were overwhelmed by the generosity of the villagers. They told us that £500 is the amount given to families who apply to them for a grant to help with travel and

accommodation costs when they have a young person admitted to a mental health unit out of county as there is currently no facility available in Cornwall

A jumble sale was held in October and raised £137 also for the Invictus Trust.

Further fundraising is planned at the Parish rooms in the New Year including a coffee morning and a cheese and wine evening on Saturday 18th February during which Jesse Clift has kindly offered to entertain us all with music and singing. We hope everyone will come and support fundraising for this very worthwhile charity.





Gwennap Parish Neighbourhood Development

The Parish Council has formed a Steering Group of local volunteers to create a Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) for Gwennap Parish. We need **YOU** to help us by giving us your views on what Gwennap Parish should be like in the future. It is **very important** that you, your family and your neighbours take this opportunity to make your views known.

What is a Neighbourhood Development Plan?

An NDP is a way for local people to influence the planning and development of the area in which they live and work. It lasts for 15 years and should:

- * Develop a community shared vision for Gwennap Parish.
- * Choose where new homes, shops, offices and other development should be built.
- * Influence how much housing should be built, and of what type.
- * Identify and protect important local green spaces or other treasured assets.

Once approved, our plan will have legal force in setting out what development is acceptable in our parish and for what reasons. Developers and local authority planners must take notice of it. Without an NDP we will have little control over any development that takes place and will receive less community funds from those developments. The cost of creating the plan is mostly met by a grant from central government, not by the Parish itself.

We can influence development, not stop it altogether

Our NDP must, in general, comply with Cornwall Council's Local Plan and the government's wider policies. It is likely that some new housing will have to be built in Gwennap so having an NDP in place will help us ensure that this housing is suitable for the parish and meets the needs of our area. It will also help identify the facilities and services that we need to meet the demands that new housing will make upon our community.

What to do next

Please complete the enclosed survey as fully as you can and return it to us using one of the ways described in it **BY 31**st **January 2017**.

To help you understand what's going on we will arrange local briefings for you in Frogpool, Cusgarne, Gwennap, Crofthandy and Pulla Cross in January. Watch out for the dates and times adverts.

Fly Tipping With the darker evenings now here the fly tipping incidents in the area are starting to increase. Areas being targeted in and around the parish include one rural location which had 75 tyres. These are all well used roads and I am asking for you all to vigilant, if you see someone fly tipping please report it. I do believe that the councils bulky waste collection offers very good value for money and can be much cheaper that some unlicensed waste collectors. I have also detailed below the garden waste and bulky waste charges.

- Examples of a large "special" items would be a carpet or a bath
- Examples of small "special" items could be a sink or a cooker extractor hood
- Standard items might be an ironing board or a dishwasher
- Almost all items the council collects are listed on the website as small, large or standard. They are grouped by the household room they are normally found in i.e. lounge or bedroom



Finger post sign

Finger post signs are becoming a rare sight in our rural areas, the one at the staggered crossroads at United Downs was in a very poor state of repair and was about to fall over. I reported the sign to Cormac who removed it over six months ago and they have painstakingly restored it. They have done a fantastic job and the finger post sign has now been put back into position where it will stay for another 70 years.

Winter Wellbeing is a service that is supported by Cornwall Council and the Health Service to help people who suffer during the winter months. If you are over 60, on a low income, or suffering from a long term health condition/ disability or even caring for someone there are many groups and organisations that can help.

Since 2011/12, Winter Wellness has helped the following stay warm, well and safe during Winter:

- 6,000 households (13,000 people *based on average household size of 2.27 per home);
- 755 hospital admissions prevented;
- I,200 households helped by Winter Wellness Emergency Fund electric, gas, heating oil and logs/coal to stay warm;
- 311 households remain in work and progress towards work.
- 238 households receive £84,000 of extra income through Discretionary Housing Payments, Crisis and Care Awards and/or help with Council Tax, since 2015.

Last Winter, Winter Wellness helped 1,600 households.

Key highlights include:

- 1,560 called the Freephone (run by Community Energy Plus) for help;
- 510 referred to other partners for assistance;
- 250 received energy advice (to use their heating systems better);
- 317 households assisted by Winter Wellness Emergency Fund;
- 1,000 households helped by Cornwall Rural Community Charity, Community Energy Plus and Age UK Cornwall and Isles of Scilly with advice, benefits and information
- 18 helped by Plymouth Energy Community and 6 by Shelter (British Gas Energy Trust) with energy debts.

Wider health benefits included:

- NHS saved £71,000 based on 80 hospital admissions prevented (£1 Winter Wellness saved NHS £2);
- Cornwall Community Foundation granted £5,000, that led to £24,000 of Winter Wellness and Cornwall Council Discretionary funds* (£1 CCF generated £5,33 of extra income for vulnerable householders to stay warm and well);
- Winter Wellness, helped 117 (37% of Emergency Fund) customers to receive * Crisis and Care,
 Council Tax help and Discretionary Housing Payments helping to improve their health and wellbeing more income and reduce their money worries.
- Secured £2.3m Central Heating Fund, to install central heating for the first time in 375 homes in Corn wall and Isles of Scilly. 142 homes now have new central heating (* as at 31 July 2016), with the remainder planned for completion by 31 November 2016.

CHESTNUT SOUP (serves 4)

This soup epitomises winter and is one of the things I love to make when it is cold and damp outside. It is great as a first course if you have friends over for a meal or it makes a perfect supper in itself with lovely sticky granary bread. If you are going to be brave and peel fresh chestnuts allow plenty of time! I remember the first time I tasted this soup made by two friends a very long time ago. The rest of us were sent to the pub to wait whilst they peeled what seemed like a mountain of chestnuts. When we returned they had very sore fingers but the soup was heavenly.

1 onion
1 carrot
340g / 12oz tinned whole chestnuts or
680g / 1½lb approx. fresh chestnuts
(to give 340g/12oz peeled chestnuts)
1oz butter
1½ - 1¾pts chicken stock
Bouquet garni (a bayleaf, a sprig of thyme,
3-4 parsley stalks) or a bought sachet
Black pepper & salt
4 fl.oz single cream

To garnish:

1 apple (preferably less sweet), peeled, cored and finely choppedA little lemon juiceFinely chopped parsley

Peel and slice the onion and carrot. Melt the butter in a large pan, add the vegetables and, if using them, fresh chestnuts. Cover and sweat for 5 – 6 minutes. Then, if using tinned chestnuts, add them along with the stock, bouquet garni and about 15 pepper mill twists of black pepper.



Bring to the boil and simmer for 15 -30 minutes or until the chestnuts are very tender.

Whilst the soup is simmering, prepare the apple and put in a small bowl with the lemon juice. Toss the pieces in the lemon juice to stop them going brown. Drain off any spare juice.

Remove soup from the heat and liquidise using a stick blender. Add the cream – don't be tempted to add more as it will make the soup too creamy. Add salt according to taste.

Gently reheat, stirring well to prevent soup sticking to base of saucepan, before ladling the soup into bowls. Put the chopped apple on top – don't worry if it sinks. Finally sprinkle over the chopped parsley. Serve. Happy Christmas!


