Chair's Blog

In our next Newsletter, we will feature an in-depth article about Judy Backus who runs a charity based in our Parish called 'Hidden Help.' It is a very simple idea. Rent some barns, store all kinds of donated household essentials and deliver them to anyone who is in need of that form of assistance. Judy has been a lifeline to hundreds of people through her inspirational work and was recently awarded an MBE in the New Year's Honours List. She has said, 'I was never good at anything at school. But when I got an MBE, I realised you didn't have to be clever. You just have to be tenacious and passionate about what you do.'

The name 'Hidden Help' links closely with the 'Unsung Heroes' awards. We celebrate the achievements of individuals who just get on with doing good regardless of acknowledgment or thanks. Richard Tookey is a volunteer driver, Lou Hitchens is an unpaid litter picker and Ray Humble makes sure the life-saving defibrillators in our Parish are kept in full working order. They probably don't see themselves as heroes but for the people they support and the people who nominated them, that is exactly what they are and the Parish Council are delighted to recognise their selflessness.

The Fete Committee are another group of individuals who take on the responsibility for organising this annual flagship event and keeping alive a marvellous tradition. This year it will take place on Saturday 24th June so make a date in your diary. No-one will forget the outstanding success of last year's Platinum Jubilee celebration and some of the factors which helped make that occasion unforgettable will be incorporated into this year's fete so don't plan to leave early.

It won't, of course, be possible to have a royally themed event this year with the Coronation being so close to the date of the fete. The Parish Council, working in collaboration with Cusgarne Primary School, will look at alternative ways through which this historic ceremony can be recognised.

The car boot sales are starting up again for the first and third Sundays in the month from April to September. Don't worry if you have nothing to sell or if you are fighting the urge to buy because the impromptu café is worth a visit in itself. It's amazing who you meet and catch up with. For vendors, there will be a price increase to £4.00 which still makes it ridiculously good value when compared with similar events held across the County.

Two affordable housing planning applications were considered by Councillors in January and February respectively. Neither was objected to by Members but there were those who attended the meetings to voice their concern. I want to place on record my gratitude to everyone who participated in those debates which were lively but always respectful and well-informed. The democratic process is not always easy but it is heartening when decisions can be made after listening to arguments made cogently and passionately but in an atmosphere of calm.

The Council recently adopted the Gwennap Parish Climate Emergency Action Plan. It is a short and practical document which will change and grow as it is implemented and regularly reviewed. I am grateful to the small but committed band of volunteers who support us in navigating through this top global and local priority.

With other neighbouring parishes, we have been grappling recently with the problem of those on two wheels and four who have been illegally practising their hobbies to the detriment of the environment and people's peaceful enjoyment of their homes and surrounding areas. Communities can only ever flourish where residents and visitors put the needs and interests of others above their own. Whilst no doubt the motorcyclists and drivers would point to the diminishing facilities to enable them to pursue their pastimes, that is not the fault of the residents who are blighted by the noise and inconvenience. Breaking the law is never right just because you think no-one will stop or catch you.

We are always looking for articles or pictures for the Newsletter on any subject that you think might be of interest to others. If you are one who likes to reminisce, don't just think it! Write it down and submit it to the Clerk for publication. It could the start of a glorious literary career!

Remember. It's not how clever you are. It's about tenacity and passion!

REFLECTIONS from Mary Richards

There is nothing like being asked to reflect on your memories of the Frogpool area over the last five decades to make you feel old!!

I married into a local dairy farming family and moved to Frogpool in the mid 1970's. At that time there were lots of dairy farms of varying sizes in the Parish and now there are none. In those days there were a lot more local people working in agriculture as things were less mechanized and machinery was a lot smaller. At harvest time village youngsters would offer to help load trailers with bales of hay or straw. Some farms have changed to beef, a few have sheep but this all changes the look of our



countryside. You may have noticed there is less land used for food production and more used for grazing horses.

Following the Second World War the Gwennap One & All was formed to support returning servicemen and their families. On the second Saturday in June they would hold a Gymkhana with an adult and junior ring. There were sports for the children and they were given a Saffron tea treat bun and ice cream. Senior citizens were served tea. In December the senior citizens were welcomed to Trevince by the Beauchamp family for a Christmas party where they were served high tea and were provided with entertainment. Mrs. Betty Hooper was secretary for 40 years and with her husband Dennis worked tirelessly for the Committee. When she stepped down there were others who tried to carry on the horse show side of things but this didn't last many years.

Car sharing used to be a necessity because there were far less cars on our roads and we didn't have many buses either. Frogpool was served by "the Marigold" (yes its livery was orange with a black roof). It went to Redruth on a Friday!

The Post Office in Cusgarne and the Old Shop in Frogpool closed in the early 1970's and a new bungalow with a shop and post office attached was built next to the Cornish Arms car park. It changed hands many times in the forty years or so that it was trading. It was convenient for locals and parents from the school and a good place to meet your community. Sadly custom waned as more people left the village for work and got their shopping whilst in town where inevitably the prices were cheaper. Eventually the shop was demolished to make way for a new bungalow in the car park.

The Cornish Arms has also changed hands several times but has always maintained a good reputation for its welcome and food. It has stayed at the centre of community activities, supporting the football team, providing bingo, darts, euchre, a harvest festival, and now a quiz night and Carol singing. Ross and Emma are also a great support to the community fete.

In the mid 1970's Cusgarne School had three classrooms and about 50 children and was even under threat of closure at one time because of its dropping numbers. Over the years there have obviously been many staff changes. The biggest visible change to the building was when the new hall and classroom was added in around 2000 to accommodate nearer 100 children. Where over the decades the children lived mainly in the area and a lot walked to school, families now come from further afield which causes so much more traffic and congestion in Cusgarne, in fact making it dangerous to walk to school.

Frogpool & Cusgarne have had a Women's Institute Group for fifty years. Originally they met in Cusgarne School, then moved to Frogpool Chapel for many years and are currently meeting in the Parish Rooms. Their membership has fluctuated over the years but they are always pleased to welcome new members on the first Tuesday of the month.

Frogpool & Cusgarne have had a football club for generations. Originally they played in the One & All field in Frogpool moving to a field off Quakers road until the opening of the Richard Jory Playing field in the mid 1980's.

The Playing field was compulsorily purchased from Mr. Barnett and the Gwennap Recreation Field Committee was formed of motivated parishoners. They held various events to raise money for the original play equipment such as a Fete and Bonfire night party. Sadly Insurance and Health & Safety put pay to the fireworks. However the Playing field has had a revamp thanks to generous grants and has almost become a victim of its own success with the number of families using the play equipment on a good day. It has also been the venue for the Car Boot Sales on Sunday mornings from April to September.

For the last decade we have held the Gwennap Parish Community Fete. This started out at Cusgarne School but soon outgrew there and so now late in June the Fete is held in the Playing Field. Well supported it provides stalls, games, a raffle, teas, free children's entertainment, musical entertainment, firstly we had Lanner & District Band but now we have Double Bounce and this year includes Ritzy Belles. We have had displays of vintage vehicles, a steam engine, with something to entertain everyone. We also have a BBQ and Bar. However as the years go on and we get older we need more young people to get involved.

For some of us visiting graves in the Frogpool Cemetry is the best reminder of the people and events that we have lost but also remind us of all the good times we have had in the last fifty years. They may be gone but never forgotten.









The Parish Hall is now Single Use Plastic Free!



Single-use plastic, whether from lunch wrap or bags, takes anywhere from 20 to 1,000 years to break down. We weren't aware that the oil could be used to treat small burns and that if you have too much of its heady aroma that it could prevent you from relaxing and sleeping.

At our March meeting we always celebrate our birthday and this year our WI is fifty one years old. We are thrilled that Mim and Rose, two of our founder members still attend. The National Federation of Women's Institutes sent us a congratulatory certificate for our fiftieth birthday which arrived recently and has now been framed and will join our banner on the wall at the Parish Rooms. We had delicious birthday cake with our tea and will celebrate with a meal out for members later in the month. Our annual meeting always takes place in March and we were joined by Liz, a WI Advisor to oversee the proceedings. Sue remains as President and Mim as Treasurer. Sandy stepped down after five years as Secretary and Sally is taking on the position. Gerry will still be the record secretary and we are grateful for Sue P joining the committee. Sally and Sue both have a wealth of administrative experience between them and will be real assets to the group.

We have been lucky enough to be able to attend many events arranged by the Cornwall Federation of WI's as there is always a high demand for places amongst the groups. An Italian meal was enjoyed in January and a talk on the life of Mary Queen of Scots by Lesley Smith who is a renowned historian and expert on medieval women's diseases was fascinating. Lesley who dressed in period costume for her talk lives at Tutbury Castle where Mary was imprisoned and executed.

Ten members attended the International Women's Day afternoon tea at the Penventon Hotel where through Dr Lesley Trotter we learned of Cornish Women who over the last three hundred years had contributed to history in their own right or enabled the men folk in their lives to make their name by the women carrying the burden of looking after home and children.

Future events include a Chocoholics tasting afternoon, a "What's in my Trolley" cookery demonstration at the invitation of Carnon Downs WI and the Chairman's coffee morning at Marazion followed by shopping in St Ives. It's been a terrific half term so far at Cusgarne Primary School. This week all three of our classes performed in the Story Telling category at the Cornwall Music Festival in Truro. Each class gave outstanding performances with excellent expression, tone, pace and actions, and they received fantastic comments and feedback from the judges. Our Recorder Trio gave an outstanding and confident performance, and were placed first in

their category! One of our Year 4 girls also entered the Solo section, and delivered a beautiful and assured solo performance. It always makes us proud to see our pupils striving to make the most of every moment, and we couldn't be more proud of the courage it took to stand up in that large



room and perform in front of a room full of people and judges!

Last week Kingfisher Class (Years 5 & 6) had a fantastic day out at a STEM Science & Engineering day at RNAS Culdrose – the day was jam packed with exciting interactive and hands on activities, that inspired and excited our pupils – our next generation of scientists and engineers! We were proud to receive an award for the way in which our children engaged with the day, and their excellent questions. They came back buzzing and couldn't stop talking about all the wonderful experiences they had had. A big thank you to RNAS Culdrose for organising and hosting such a brilliant day.

Peat Free Compost Collection

It was very exciting to have such a positive response to the first Peat-free Compost sale in the parish on February 19th - a big thank you to everyone who came and supported this initiative. Further events are planned on 25th March (before this newsletter is published I know!) and Saturday 22rd April. These will be at the Pulla Cross

Playing Field from 9 - 10am.

The compost is supplied by the Green Waste Company based down in St Erth and has proved to be of an excellent quality for growing plants, mulching, container planting and general all-round garden use and is helping us all to speed up the move away from using peat-based products in our gardens.

Although the initial use of recycled compost bags has been successful, (and has been a great way of re-using bags), having identified that there is a demand for this in the Parish, we are looking at ways to make this more sustainable for the future. This will probably be based around the excellent system already in use in the trail-blazing St Day & Carharrack scheme, using robust bags which can be brought back for re-filling time and time again. Thank you again for supporting this initiative and we look forward to seeing you in the future.



This recipe could not be simpler as there is no cooking. I have made it many times and it always receives rave reviews and ultra-clean pudding plates at the end of the meal. This is also a great recipe for children to make as a treat for Mum at Easter as it's so easy. Just a note to bear in mind: it needs to be made at least the day before eating so that it can firm up in the fridge.

Biscuit base:

250g/8oz digestive biscuits 125g/4oz unsalted butter, gently melted (You can make the base slightly thinner with a ratio of 200g:100g / 7oz:31/2oz)

Cheesecake filling:

500g/18oz full fat cream cheese 1tsp vanilla extract 100g/3½oz icing sugar, sieved 150g/5oz caramel* 1-2tsp sea salt flakes 300ml/10fl.oz double cream



Line the base and sides of a 20cm/8" springform (essential) cake tin with non-stick baking paper.

* For the caramel you can use Carnation tinned Caramel. However, for taste, I prefer buying Carnation Condensed Milk and boiling the can in water for an hour then letting it cool down in cold water. My top tip is to put the can inside a sealed plastic bag, from which as much air as possible has been excluded, before placing in the saucepan of water. If the can is placed directly in the saucepan of water you will find at the end of the hour's boiling a large amount of the glue from the label has stuck to the sides of your saucepan and it is a real job to scrub it off. You will have caramel left over so just put the remainder in a small plastic tub and freeze for future use.

Crush the biscuits and mix with the melted butter. Spread over the base of the cake tin and press down firmly. Chill in the fridge.

Using either an electric hand whisk or food mixer with whisk attachment, whisk together the icing sugar, cream cheese and vanilla essence.

Add the caramel and whisk again until smooth and lump free.

Pour in the double cream and a teaspoon of the sea salt and continue to whisk on a medium speed until the mixture is very very thick; it should be able to support deep troughs and peaks. This could happen quickly or take several minutes. Taste for saltiness and add more according to taste but no more than a total of two teaspoons.

Spread over the biscuit base, trying not to incorporate air pockets. Smooth the top and chill in the fridge overnight.

As it is a very plain-looking cheesecake you might choose to decorate the top with soft fruit; raspberries go particularly well. Serve with single or unwhipped double cream if you want to add further calories of decadence. The plaudits will come thick and fast.

This cheesecake will keep several days and freezes well; it is also very nice semifreddo.
